Vary	To change or be different
Illustrator	Someone who creates images, usually for books or magazines
Artist	Anyone who creates art
Materials	Stuff we use in making art
Techniques	A way of doing something
Observing	Looking carefully
Observation	Something you notice
Outline	To change or be different
Template	A shape or pattern that you cut or draw around to make the same shape on paper, card, metal or materials
Lettering	Letters written or printed on something
Template	A shape or a pattern that you draw or cut around to make the same shape
Line guide	Lines which help the writer with the formation and sizing of their handwriting
Colour palette	The set of colours used by an artist
Commercial	To do with buying or selling goods
familiar	Well known or easily recognised
Auction	A sale where goods are sold to person who offers the most money for them
