<b>commandments:</b>	Rules from God about how people should live
<b>Mount Sinai:</b>	A mountain where Moses received the 10 Commandments
<b>Sabbath:</b>	A special day for resting and spending time with God
<b>covet:</b>	To want something that belongs to someone else
<b>altruism:</b>	Caring for and helping others, even if you get nothing back
<b>humility:</b>	Not showing off
<b>empathy:</b>	Understanding how someone else feels
<b>ethical development:</b>	Learning how to make good and fair choices as you grow
<b>ethics:</b>	Ideas about what is right or wrong
<b>reason:</b>	Thinking carefully to make a sensible decision
<b>morals:</b>	Rules or beliefs to help you know right from wrong
<b>compassion</b>	Caring about others and wanting to help them
<b>code of conduct:</b>	A set of rules which shows how to behave
<b>peace</b>	Freedom from disturbance
